# **Introducing the Greater Salt Lake Municipal Services District**

The Greater Salt Lake Municipal Services District, also known as the MSD, is the service provider and contract administrator for White City Metro Township and several other MSD member communities (Town of Brighton, Copperton Metro Township, Emigration Canyon Metro Township, Kearns Metro Township, Magna Metro Township, Unincorporated Salt Lake County). The MSD works with each of its member communities to evaluate and address the needs of that community. The MSD Board of Trustees is composed of member community Mayors and a member of the Salt Lake County Council who represent the interest of their citizenry. The MSD receives its funding from the Metro Townships, the Town of Brighton and Unincorporated Salt Lake County communities through sales tax, Class B and C highway funds, fees, grants and other revenues.

- Not have already received federal, state or local
- COVID-19 financial aid
- Provide documents verifying your financial loss
- Have operated prior to Jan. 1, 2020
- Be primary industries impacted directly by public health order closures\*

### **Modified Area Cleanup Fact Sheet**

### **White City Metro Township**

and the Southeast islands will have containers available for reservation from Friday, September 11th through Thursday, September 17th. There will be 85 containers available per day, which is approximately 1 container per 8 households if homeowners choose to share their reserved container.



#### Here is how it works:

- Reservations will open to residents when they receive their postcards, approximately three weeks in advance of the available dates.
- Reservations are made on our website: wasatchfrontwaste.org They will be on a firstcome-first basis.
- Containers will be placed in the homeowner's driveway.

#### **Reasons for modified Program:**

 For the past three years, WFWRD has not been able to adequately staff this program with the 21 drivers needed for the traditional service. For the 2020 program, WFWRD was only able to hire 16 out of the needed 21 drivers needed for the traditional program.

- The COVID-19 pandemic has proven to be a challenge to keep employees healthy and working.
- Residential services are the number one priority and WFWRD cannot take drivers from these services to cover Area Cleanup (ACUP)
- The National Waste & Recycling Association's safety recommendations state that waste haulers

should not physically handle residents' waste during the COVID-19 pandemic. The ACUP always bring garbage and debris piles on the streets that must be physically handled by employees



#### **Benefits to the Modified Program:**

- Residents who need the service are utilizing it without the issues of it being full before they can use it.
- No mini landfills. WFWRD employees have not had to physically handle the waste.
- A manageable workload even with staff shortages because of the efficiencies with not having to deal with piles in the streets around the containers.
- The majority of residents who requested the service were accommodated.
- No "mini-landfills" that create health and safety hazards, and WFWRD employees must physically handle the waste.
- Reduced scavenging.
- Reduced illegal dumping and containers being abused by contractors, landscapers, and residents who do not live in the District.

#### Residents' concerns are as follows:

- Containers will cause damage to driveways.
- There may be minor scrapes from the metal wheels, but there have been no permanent damages.
- Driveways are not large enough to hold a container.
- The containers are 8' x 12' and weigh 1.7 tons. If the driveways are not blocked, the container will fit.
- There will not be enough containers for every neighborhood due to the first come, first served reservation system.
- WFWRD does not have resources to provide a container for every home, nor does every home need a container.
- WFWRD does not dictate where the containers will go.
- What about people coming on to properties without permission? (This is trespassing)
- We are informing residents that if they reserve a container, it is up to them to share it and invite their neighbors to use it.





# **Sego Lily Drive Plan**

White City Metro Township is in an exciting and unique position to re-imagine and transform Sego Lily Drive into a community centerpiece that is comfortable, beautiful, and inviting for all users. One of the goals of the project is to implement a "Complete Street" approach linking neighborhoods, connecting communities, and encouraging walking and bicycling.



This initial part of the project is focusing on collaborating with residents and key community stakeholders about the benefits of transforming the

corridor into a community gateway. We have integrated a rigorous technical analysis, extensive community outreach involving compelling visuals that tell the story of what this corridor can become.

Sego Lily is a wide road (with 55 feet of pavement) and this is an opportunity to improve safety and walkability without impacting private yards, there is also an element to provide traffic calming measures to slow down drivers along the roadway that we have heard about from residents for many years.

In April each residence on Sego Lily received a hand delivered survey allowing them to comment on what they would like the future of the corridor to look like. More than half of the 141 homes returned their surveys and others commented online. The results, while mixed, showed a strong desire of residents to add a pedestrian path and to keep on-street parking.



The on-going study is now looking at the specific design elements of adding lighting and integrating into existing sidewalks. This study will conclude later this summer. For more information please contact Madeline Francisco-Galang at:

#### What is a General Plan?

The General Plan establishes the long-term vision and goals of White City: consider it the guiding compass for the community. The plan acts as an advisory guide for how land will be used within White City. It also addresses the actions that will be taken to address moderate income housing and transportation needs.

#### Who's writing the General Plan?

In short, YOU. The White City Metro Township Council appointed White City residents to serve on the General Plan Steering Committee. The Steering Committee elected a Chair and Vice-chair, who lead the group and work closely with MSD planning staff to determine agendas and organize meetings. White City's vision for its future and how to get there are generated by the Committee members and through gathering public feedback. The White City General Plan is White City's Plan!

#### What will be in the final General Plan?

When completed sometime in the first quarter of 2021, White City's General Plan will have the following chapters,

some of which are required by Utah State Code 10-9a-403:

- Introduction
- Background
- Community Engagement
- Land Use (State requirement)
- Transportation (State requirement)
- Housing (State requirement)
- Economic Opportunities
- Infrastructure and Resilience

## **White City Community Council Plant Swap**

This is an event for garden enthusiasts who live in the White City Metro area and beyond. Let us get together to share our plants with our neighbors and make White City even more beautiful! All plant types are welcome, from indoor plants, edible plants, exotic plants and native species. Please do not bring anything that is considered invasive (A list will be posted on Facebook page of invasive species).

Event date is September 26th, 2020 from 8:00am – 2:00pm and will be held at the pavilion at Big Bear Park in White City. The first hour of the swap will be dedicated to those who have plants to trade and the following five hours will be for open trading (no need to have plants to swap).

Tables will have labels for the different types of plant categories and a potting station with free potting soil will be provided for those with bare root plants. We will also be providing a sanitation station with hand sanitizer, sanitizing sprays and wipes.

First five people to arrive will receive a free concrete planter bowl.

Rules for the plant swap for the first hour:

- Receive one ticket for each healthy potted plant or rooted cutting that you bring to the swap. (Please clearly label each plant. It is optional to provide care instructions.)
- 2. Trade tickets in for plants! (Always ask before taking, some plants may already have homes.)
- 3. Enjoy your new friends (Both the planted ones and the people)!

Rules for the plant swap for the second five hours:

- Request plant material from anyone with extra plants. If you have extra plants, be kind and share your plants and knowledge with those looking for new plants.

# **White City Metro Township Trail**



White City Metro Township in partnership with Sandy City has completed a trail project along the abandoned Sandy Irrigation Canal corridor between 106000 South and Dimple Dell Regional Park. An asphalt trail was completed on the former maintenance road, paralleling the Canal, which was previously used to maintain the facility. Roadway crossing features were also added to improve access across Larkspur and Carnation Drives. The new trail is a part of a larger regional trail system crossing Dimple Dell Regional Park. The irrigation canal, which no longer conveys water, continues to function as a storm water facility with a new outlet structure being constructed to safely discharge storm water into Dry Creek.

The project manager is Madeline Francisco-Galang and Jed Parker the project engineer. Construction began in Fall of 2019 with substantial completion in June of 2020. The total construction cost of the project was \$550,143. A grant in the amount of \$250,000 from Utah the Department Transportation as part of their Transportation Alternative Program helped to fund this project along with funding from the MSD and Sandy City. The completed trail is open to all users including bicyclists and pedestrians from kids to seniors and soon all will be able to cross a newly constructed bridge spanning Dimple Dell Regional Park and Dry Creek to connect the trail to Big Bear Park. The trail on the south side connects to the Sandy and Draper portion of the trail on the south side 10600 South and continues to 12150 South connecting to the Porter Rockwell trail. This is a great amenity to the residents of White City and allows for an alternative mode of transportation and recreation for all ages.

South Salt Lake Valley Mosquito Abatement District (SSLVMAD) works hard to promote public health and quality of life. During the current COVID-19 pandemic, SSLVMAD personnel are committed to following guidance from government and public health officials to promote safety from this virus while still doing what we can to minimize health risks associated with mosquito-borne disease.

Fortunately, according to the World Health Organization, there is no evidence to suggest that COVID-19 can be transmitted by mosquitoes. Unfortunately, though many people would not consider the biting behavior of mosquitoes an essential function, there is also no evidence to suggest that mosquitoes will heed public health guidance to reduce close contact with people, therefore, the risk of mosquito-borne illness, such as West Nile virus, remains.

**Mosquitoes complete** the early stages of their life cycle in stagnant water in places ranging from ponds, marshy areas, and irrigated pasture-lands, to gutters, cavities in trees, and bird baths. During the summer, nearly any water left standing for at least one week can provide suitable conditions for larval mosquitoes to develop into adults.

**You can help** control the population of mosquitoes by:

- Eliminating unnecessary standing water from your property.
- Emptying and refreshing desirable standing water at least weekly.
- Treating livestock watering troughs and ornamental ponds with mosquito control products (this service is available free of charge from SSLVMAD). Reporting other standing water or mosquito problems to SSLVMAD.

**Additionally**, the following suggestions can help you avoid being bitten by mosquitoes

- **Use mosquito repellents** approved by the Environmental Protection Agency according to instructions on the product label.
- **Wear light-colored**, loose-fitting clothing that covers as much skin as possible when outdoors.
- Avoid outdoor activities during times of peak mosquito activity (between dusk and dawn for several species of mosquitoes including disease vectors known to occur in Utah).

**Summer provides** a great time to participate in a variety of outdoor activities. Unwelcome mosquitoes, however, can make many outdoor activities less enjoyable. Familiarity with basic mosquito biology and some simple precautions can help reduce the negative impact of mosquitoes.

Adult female mosquitoes take blood meals from vertebrate hosts to obtain protein required for egg production. In addition to causing an irritating allergic reaction, mosquito bites can facilitate disease transmission. West Nile virus is an example of a disease transmitted by mosquitoes in Salt Lake Valley.

South Salt Lake Valley Mosquito Abatement District (SSLVMAD) seeks to promote public health and quality of life by reducing the number of larval mosquitoes that develop to the adult stage. District technicians regularly inspect known larval mosquito habitat in Salt Lake Valley and apply mosquito control measures as needed. Treatments targeting adult mosquitoes are also applied when appropriate.

# Coronavirus Response

The County Government Center is closed as of March 28th; however our services are still operating.

Aging & Adult Services is still open during the coronavirus outbreak, but some of our programs are operating with new procedures to protect public health.

AAS serves older adults aged 60+ and their caregivers. Eligibility requirements remain in place for all our programs and services. To sign up for services, call (385) 468-3200.

#### **New Client Intake**

New client intake is being conducted by the outreach team via phone. To sign up for services, call the outreach team at (385) 468-3200.

### **Senior Centers & Congregate Meals**

Senior Centers are currently closed. AAS is offering drive-thru meal pickup daily at 15 of our <u>Senior Center locations</u>. Call your center to reserve a meal or for more information. If you aren't already a member of one of our senior centers, please call the outreach team at **(385) 468-3200** to get set up.

Note: River's Bend meals are now being served at Sunday Anderson Westside Senior Center.

#### Meals on Wheels

Meals on Wheels is operating with new social distancing procedures. Drivers are not entering client homes; meals are placed in a bag and hung on the client's door handle, and drivers then wait from a distance of ten feet to ensure the client receives their meal.

#### **Rides for Wellness**

Rides for Wellness has implemented stringent sanitation and precautionary measures. Drivers are sanitizing vehicles after every ride. Individuals who believe they have COVID-19 or other cold/flu symptoms should call prior to receiving a ride.

#### **In-Home Services & Caregiver Support**

In-Home Services and Caregiver Support are operating with new social distancing procedures. Case managers are not entering client homes; client communication is being conducted via phone. New intakes for program eligibility are being conducted via phone.

### **Ombudsman Program**

The Ombudsman team are no longer entering longterm residential and nursing care facilities. Case management and client follow-up are being conducted via phone.

#### **Volunteers**

Meals on Wheels and Rides for Wellness volunteer programs are still active. All other in-person volunteer activities have been suspended. Friendly visiting and companion volunteers are encouraged to check in on their clients by phone rather than in person. Contact your volunteer coordinator if you have questions about your volunteer activities.

#### Administration

AAS is working closely with the Salt Lake County Health Department and Salt Lake County leadership to follow CDC recommended practices and guidelines for ensuring staff, client, and volunteer safety. Although the County Government Center is closed as of March 28, 2020, our services are still active and operating.

# Greater Salt Lake Services District (aka MSD) Funding:

The MSD receives its funding from the Metro Townships, the Town of Brighton and unincorporated communities through sales tax, Class B and C highway funds, fees, grants and other revenues. The MSD contracts with agencies to provide Public Works, Animal Services, Planning and Development, Engineering, Parks, Justice Courts, Municipal Prosecution, and Indigent Legal Services.

The District's Board of Trustees contracts with Salt Lake County for most services. The Board sets service levels allocates funding and establishes policies. The District's General Manager carries out the direction of the Board.

# Difference between the MSD and the Metro Townships:

The Metro Townships and the Town of Brighton are independent municipalities that are members of the MSD. Each MSD member has an elected Mayor and Council. These officials represent the interest of the citizens of the individual Township or Town. The MSD Board of Trustees is made up of each of the Mayors of the Metro Townships, the Town of Brighton and a member of the Salt Lake County Council.

The MSD's role is to evaluate the needs of all the Metro Townships, the Town of Brighton, and Unincorporated Salt Lake County and to use the funding to accomplish those needs. The MSD is the service provider and they oversee all contracts with agencies to provide the services. The MSD Board of Trustees also has sole property tax authority over the District (5 Metro Townships, Town of Brighton, and Unincorporated Salt Lake County.

# **Historically**

Historically Salt Lake County provided municipal services to areas that had not incorporated as cities. In the 1980s these areas grew to a population of more than 250,000, making the County the largest provider of municipal services in Utah.

As communities incorporated into cities, and as cities annexed lucrative commercial areas from the remaining unincorporated communities, it became more difficult for the County to fund municipal

services. In addition, historical portions of some communities were lost to neighboring cities.

# **Metro Townships**


To shore up the remaining community boundaries and tax base, the Legislature authorized most unincorporated-area voters to choose their futures in 2015. All unincorporated townships would become municipalities, but voters in each township could choose whether to make their community a Metro Township or a City. Residents of islands—unincorporated areas surrounded by cities—could vote to either annex or remain unincorporated.

Millcreek Township voters chose to become a city. Voters in the Townships of Copperton, Emigration Canyon, Kearns, Magna and White City chose to become Metro Townships. Metro Townships are a new type of municipality with most of a city's powers. These voters also chose to receive their services from the MSD. Some island voters chose to annex and others did not.

# **Municipal Services District**

The County Council created the MSD in late 2015 under the authorization of the Utah State Legislature. The District began operating in January 2016. The County Council sat as the original Board of Trustees. Voters elected Metro Township Council members in November 2016. The Chair of each Council, along with one County Council member, took over as the Board of Trustees in January 2017. The Board also included the Mayor of Millcreek, which was a member of the District from January through June 2017.

Metro Township Councils now choose a Mayor from among Council members. The Mayor serves on the Board of Trustees along with one County Council Member.
