White City Crime Watch Corner

The MOST important thing YOU can do is CALL THE POLICE to report a CRIME or any SUSPICIOUS activity. Officers cannot be everywhere at all times, thus it is important you help by being their eyes and ears. **IMPORTANT NOTE** - you can always remain a pair of anonymous eyes and ears.

Light up your residence, **lock** your doors at all times and call the Police when you see something suspicious, something that doesn't look right or doesn't feel right.

Some crime prevention tips for a safe summer:

- Lock all outside doors and windows before going away even for a short time.
- If you are going to be away for a length of time, connect some lamps to automatic timers to turn on in the evening and off during the day. Make your home appear to be occupied.
- Keep your garage door closed at all times.
- Secure your expensive items ie grills, lawn mowers and bicycles by storing them out of sight.
- Remember to cancel your mail and/or paper delivery if going on vacation.
- Always lock your garden sheds and garages.
- Secure your car, NEVER leave anything of value in plain view.
- Make sure shrubbery/trees around your entrances or dark areas of your home are kept trimmed.
- Motion sensors around your home are a great deterrent for unwanted guests.
- If you have a home alarm system, USE IT! Activate your alarm.
- Most importantly, know your neighbors and surroundings.

Not only do we offer animal control services, pet licensing, and pet adoptions, but we also offer special discounted services to citizens in our jurisdictions.

As a citizen of White City, you are eligible for these FREE services for your pet:

- **All** licensed dogs can receive a FREE microchip and a FREE DHPP vaccine.
- **All** licensed cats can receive a FREE microchip and FREE FVRCP vaccine.
- **FREE** rabies clinics are held twice a month and are by appointment only.

- **FREE** spay/neuter clinics are available throughout the year and most are sponsored by our non-profit partner, Utah FACES. Please check with us to see when the next clinic is available on our website, **Facebook** page, or email animal@slco.org.
- **Seniors to Seniors:** If you're over the age of 55, you are eligible to adopt any animal over the age of 5 for FREE.

Are You Missing Your Pet?

Click the link below to see photos of animals that are currently in our shelter. We try to photograph every animal, but occasionally we cannot get a photo, such as if an animal is injured or aggressive. We also maintain a list of all the animals that were picked up deceased. If you are missing your pet, the only way to guarantee that your pet is not here is to visit the shelter in person as soon as possible!

My Pet was Picked up by Animal Control. How do I retrieve it?

Animals impounded will be redeemed to a person over 18 who can provide proof of identification and animal ownership. Redemption fees will apply; we accept cash, credit cards, and checks. Please note that we cannot quote fees over the phone. Please bring current, valid photo identification and one or more of the following to prove ownership:

- Location and date when pet was last seen;
- Age and sex of the animal;
- Current photos of the pet;
- Veterinary records for the pet, including proof of vaccinations and proof of sterilization;
- Microchip information

What Should I Do If My Pet Is Missing?

DON'T EVER ASSUME that your pet was stolen or will come back on its own.

VISIT local animal shelters within 24 hours of losing your pet.

ASK to check the **ISOLATION** and **QUARANTINE** kennels when visiting shelters. Also ask about any animal that may have been picked up deceased.

POST lost pet cards or flyers on lost and found boards at local shelters, veterinary clinics, and other public bulletin boards when available. Post to [Utah Lost and Found Pets on Facebook](#).

LOOK for your pet during the day **AND AT NIGHT**.

CALL nearby veterinary offices to see if your pet was brought in as an injured stray.

PLACE lost pet ads in local papers and classified sections of websites under the lost & found columns, such as [KSL](#) and/or [Craigslist](#).

CHECK all the [shelters in the area](#). Your pet could end up at any one of them.

DON'T GIVE UP! Often a pet will not arrive in a shelter for weeks and sometimes even months after first becoming lost. Keep ID tags current and microchip your pet!

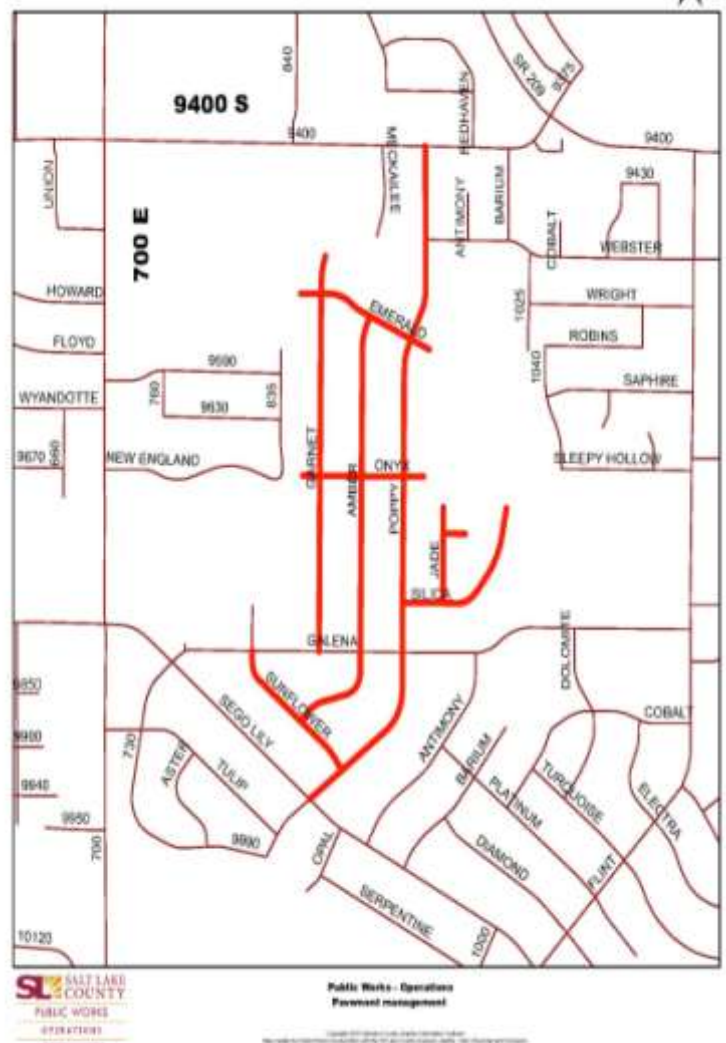

Learn How Majority of Roads Get Funded

WFRC Releases Program Identifying Billions in Transportation Investment

The Wasatch Front Regional Council (WFRC) invites you to comment on the [Draft 2018-2023 Transportation Improvement Program](#) (TIP). Totalling more than \$5 billion in vital transportation funding, the TIP identifies balanced investments in road, transit, bike, and pedestrian infrastructure that are needed in Salt Lake, Davis, Weber, Tooele, Morgan, and Box Elder counties.

In close collaboration with the Utah Department of Transportation (UDOT), the Utah Transit Authority (UTA), and cities and counties across the Wasatch Front, the TIP is updated every year and identifies federal, state, and local funding for projects over the next six years. Learn more and comment via WFRC's [online interactive map](#).

Representatives will be available to answer questions about the TIP projects via two in-person open houses held on Tuesday, July 18 at the Ogden Intermodal Center at 2350 Wall Avenue in Ogden and Thursday, July 20 at the Salt Lake Central Station at 250 South 600 West in Salt Lake City. Both events will run from 4:30 pm to 7:00 pm.

Portions of the open houses will be streamed live via WFRC's [Facebook](#) account.

The Transportation Improvement Program (TIP) is a six-year program of highway, transit, and active transportation projects for the Salt Lake City-West Valley City and Ogden-Layton urbanized areas. Funding comes from various federal, state, and local sources dedicated to transportation. The program implements state and local road, transit, bike, and pedestrian projects identified in the WFRC Regional Transportation Plan and other plans. WFRC works with local governments, the Utah Department of Transportation, and the Utah Transit Authority to develop the TIP. Public input is sought each year on projects proposed for inclusion in the program.

To comment on the proposed projects, please view the [Draft 2018 - 2023 TIP Interactive Map](#) and provide comments via the public comment layer. Public comment on the Draft 2018-2023 TIP runs through Saturday, August 5.

Representatives will be available to answer questions about the TIP projects via two **in-person open houses** held on Tuesday, July 18 at the Ogden Intermodal Center at 2350 Wall Avenue in Ogden and Thursday, July 20 at the Salt Lake Central Station at 250 South 600 West in Salt Lake City. Both events will run from 4:30 pm to 7:00 pm. **Portions of the open houses will be streamed live via WFRC's [Facebook](#) account.**

The TIP helps to meet the region's transportation needs and provide for the operation and maintenance of the existing transportation system. WFRC is responsible for selecting projects in the TIP that receive funding from three federal

funding programs - 1) the Urban Surface Transportation Program (STP), 2) the Congestion Mitigation Air Quality Program (CMAQ), and 3) the Transportation Alternatives Program (TAP).

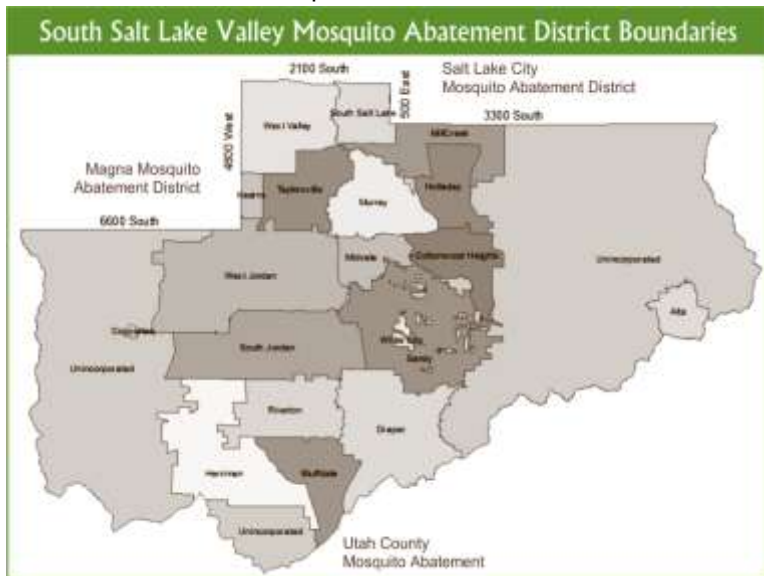

- ❖ Summer provides a great time to participate in a variety of outdoor activities. Unwelcome mosquitoes, however, can make many outdoor activities less enjoyable. Familiarity with basic mosquito biology and some simple precautions can help reduce the negative impacts of mosquitoes.
- ❖ Mosquitoes complete the early stages of their life cycle in stagnant water in places ranging from ponds, marshy areas, and irrigated pasture-lands, to gutters, cavities in trees, and bird baths. During the summer, nearly any water left standing for at least one week can provide suitable conditions for larval mosquitoes to develop into adults.
- ❖ Adult female mosquitoes take blood meals from vertebrate hosts to obtain protein required for egg production. In addition to causing an irritating allergic reaction, mosquito bites can facilitate disease transmission. West Nile virus is an example of a disease transmitted by mosquitoes in the Salt Lake Valley.
- ❖ You can help control the population of mosquitoes by:
- ❖ Eliminating unnecessary standing water from your property.
- ❖ Emptying and refreshing desirable standing water at least weekly.
- ❖ Treating livestock watering troughs and ornamental ponds with mosquito control products or fish (this service is available free of charge from the SSLVMAD).
- ❖ Reporting other standing water to the SSLVMAD.
- ❖ Additionally, the following suggestions can help you avoid being bitten by mosquitoes:
- ❖ Use mosquito repellents approved by the Environmental Protection Agency according to instructions on the product label.

- ❖ Wear light-colored, loose-fitting clothing that covers as much skin as possible when outdoors.
- ❖ Avoid outdoor activities during times of peak mosquito activity (between dusk and dawn for several species of mosquitoes including disease vectors known to occur in Utah).
- ❖ For additional information about mosquitoes and mosquito control or to submit a request for service please visit www.sslvmad.org. Additional information about Zika virus and other mosquito-borne diseases can be obtained from the Salt Lake County Health Department, or Centers for Disease Control and Prevention.
- ❖ Mosquitoes require standing water to complete the early stages of their life-cycle. Mosquito larvae develop in water for several days to a few weeks before emerging as adults. You can help control the mosquito population by interrupting the life-cycle through eliminating unnecessary standing water and ensuring that desirable standing water is treated with mosquito control products. For more information about mosquitoes and mosquito control please visit www.sslvmad.org.
- ❖ There are around 3,500 mosquito species in the world. About 25 of those species have been observed in Salt Lake County. Different species present different levels of nuisance capacity and health risk to humans. Currently, the primary health risk from mosquitoes in Salt Lake County is West Nile virus. Mosquito species capable of transmitting this disease are most active from dusk to dawn. Aggressive, day-biting mosquito species in Salt Lake County can be a nuisance, but are not known to transmit disease to humans. 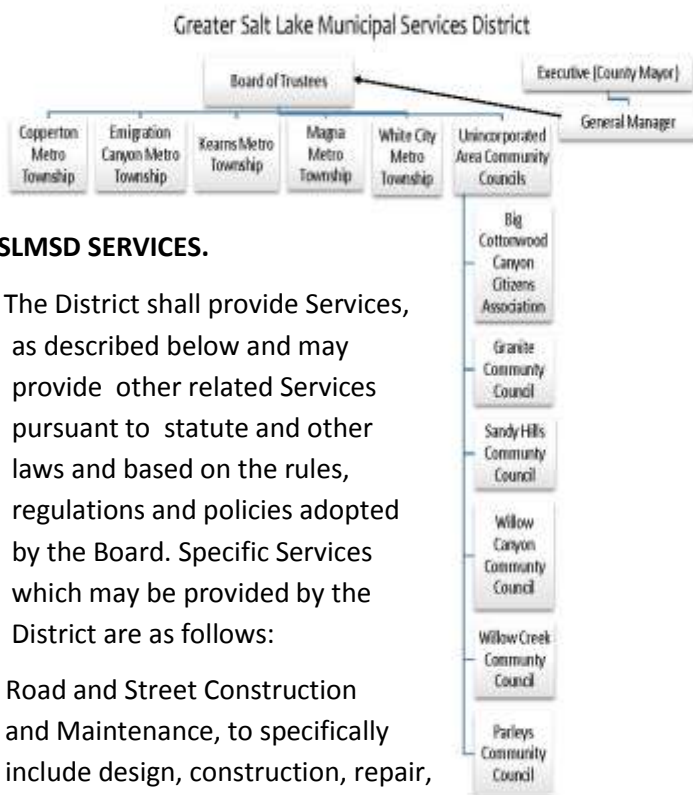
Greater Salt Lake Municipal Services District

What is the Municipal Services District?

The Municipal Services District (MSD) manages the revenue and the budget paying for delivery of municipal services for the metro townships and unincorporated areas of Salt Lake County.

Municipal services are services often managed by cities, such as road maintenance and street lights, storm drains, and snow removal. [See a complete list of the municipal services Salt Lake County currently provides.](#)

GSLMSD SERVICES.

A. The District shall provide Services, as described below and may provide other related Services pursuant to statute and other laws and based on the rules, regulations and policies adopted by the Board. Specific Services which may be provided by the District are as follows:

- Road and Street Construction and Maintenance, to specifically include design, construction, repair, curb, gutter, sidewalk, street lighting, traffic control lights and signage, striping, snow removal, and local storm drain

construction and maintenance;

ii. Animal Control Services;

iii. Business and Land Use Development, to specifically include economic development and planning and zoning staff services to various planning commissions, and shall also include business licensing, building inspection, and code violation enforcement; and

iv. Municipal Parks, to specifically include maintenance of local or neighborhood parks, as currently defined by the County.

A bear seemed like just the thing to sculpture as part of his thesis. An 11-ton piece of granite rock was purchased for about \$500 and placed at the Wilford H. Hansen Stone Quarries, 8809 S. 600 West, Sandy.

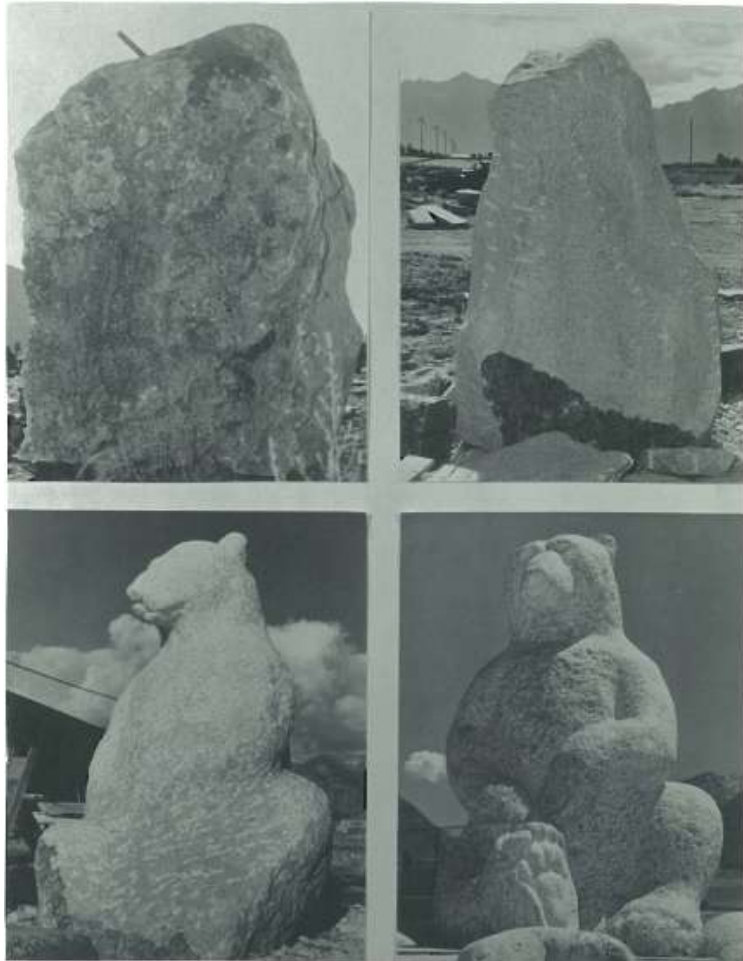
